Community Bushfire Recovery Grants

Stage 1 of the \$400,000 Community Bushfire Recovery Grants program has now closed. Thank you to the Alpine Shire residents, groups, and organisations who put forward an expression of interest. Alpine Shire Council looks forward to working with community members on their applications to further develop projects, programs, and events that will support our communities.

BRV Grants

Bushfire Recovery Victoria is delivering a number of grants: one of up to \$50,000 for community facilities, and another for local community projects of up to \$2 million in conjunction with the Commonwealth Government. WHAT'S NEW

- The CRC launched a survey at the beginning of September to gain a deeper understanding of the recovery needs of local Alpine communities. Over 200 people across the region have completed the survey, which is a great result so far with valuable information to inform the Community Recovery Plan. The survey is open until November 1 and can be accessed by visiting <u>www.surveymonkey.com/r/alpinecrc1</u>.
- We have worked with Alpine Shire Council to support upgrades for telecommunications resilience across the region.
- Local Economic Recovery (LER) Grants have been announced by the state and federal government. The CRC worked co-operatively with other local organisations to successfully lobby for the Alpine Resort communities to be included in this funding opportunity.

WHAT'S COMING UP

- It is the season for preparing our properties for the upcoming summer.

- Future newsletters will share key findings from our survey. These findings will also be used to guide planning to support community resilience and recovery into the future.
- The Inspector General Emergency Management is conducting the Independent Inquiry into the 2019–20 Victorian Fire Season. People from the Alpine district are invited to share their experiences of emergency relief and early recovery since the fires by joining a focus group. GRANTS

- The LER Grants are community-led opportunities that fund the development of local-level projects that contribute to regional economy or local community. These funds will be allocated at different stages with a major tranche available from the middle of next year, so there is time to get the necessary planning for recovery projects underway. More information about the LER grants can be found over the page.
- REC Solar is offering community organisations in bushfire-affected regions the opportunity to apply for a premium solar system free of charge, which will be fully installed by solar experts. Full program details and eligibility criteria can be found at <u>www.reconstruct.net.au</u>.
- There is no single pot of money approach to grant funding. What we do know is that there will be a range of opportunities over a period of time (at least a couple of years). The ideal action for our community today is to identify what recovery projects are needed and to scope out what needs to be done. Successful applications for funds generally go to project plans rather than great ideas.
